Tools: scissors, sandpaper/emery boards, gluing jig, ruler, pencil, **Supplies:** Wood Glue and/or Turbo Tacky or other glue of choice

Items needed in Addition to the Kit:

1. Fabric or Wallpaper: 2 pieces that coordinate well.

For 1" you will need 2 pieces about 8" x 3"
For 1/2" you will need 2 pieces about 5-1/2" x 2"
For 1/4" you will need 2 pieces about 4" x 2"

- 2. Bunka, lace or other trims: for the edges of your shade 16" long for 1"; 11" long for ½"; 6-1/2" long for ¼"
- 3. Siding for front: (see below)
- 4. A Picture Frame: 8 x 10
- 5. Wallpaper, paint, stain or whatever you want to finish your interior.

SIDING & MEASUREMENTS:



1" With Frame (Clapboard Siding)



1" Without Frame (Clapboard Siding)

Clapboard: glue pieces of clapboard siding to the front and paint the color of your choice. Measurements for Clapboard Siding:

1" <u>Sides:</u> 1/16 x 1-1/32 x 5-7/84 - 2 pcs <u>Top/Bottom:</u> 1/16 x 1-1/32 x 10 - 2 pcs ½" <u>Sides:</u> 1/16 x 13/16 x 3-1/2 - 2 pcs <u>Top/Bottom:</u> 1/16 x ³/₄ x 7 - 2 pcs ½" <u>Top/Bottom:</u> 1/16 x ³/₄ x 7 - 2 pcs Top/Bottom: 1/32 x 7/16 x 5 - 2 pcs

Fits in an 8" x 10" frame and is 3" deep. Siding and 8x10 frame not included. Finishing ideas/materials at the discretion of the cutter. Watch the Gazette for ideas on finishing your window.



1/2" With Frame (Kleenex stucco siding)



1/2" Without Frame (Kleenex stucco siding)

Stucco: There is a powder called "Roll-A-Tex" (found in hardware or paint stores) that can be mixed with any color of paint and spread on for a stucco appearance.

Another Stucco technique is to separate a Kleenex into 1 ply then tear into $\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inch pieces. Lay on the wood and paint with any acrylic or house paint. The Kleenex pieces will bunch up in the paint to create a nice textured effect.

Fits in a 5" x 7" frame and is 1-3/4" deep. Siding and 5x7 frame not included. Finishing ideas/materials at discretion of the cutter. Watch the Gazette for ideas on finishing your window.







1/4" Without Frame (brick siding)

Bricks: there are many available from mini stores, online, **OR** you can make bricks and paint them from paper clay. In the quarter inch sample I used plastic sheets of bricks which can be obtained from miniature stores, hobby stores, online at MicroMark.com or other suppliers. I used a tan brick sheet then lightly sponged on reds, whites and tans leaving the tan lines showing as the grout. Very easy in quarter or half inch. Moderately easy in 1".

Fits in a 3-1/2" x 5" frame and is 1" deep. Siding and 3-1/2x5 frame not included. Finishing ideas/ materials at the discretion of the cutter. Watch the Gazette for ideas on finishing your window.

MORE SIDING IDEAS

Before adding your siding, slip the plastic into the opening at the top of your window frame. Now, add a siding and paint or stain.

Try one of these sidings:

Board n Batten: glue on wood strips vertically:

1" - 1/16" x 1/8" about 3/4" apart

1/2" - 3/64" x 3/32" about 3/8" apart

1/4" - 1/32" x 1/16" about 3/16" apart

Stones: use torn pieces of egg cartons. Glue them to the surface, then paint them all a solid gray, white or tan which will be the color of the cement between the stones eventually. Then dry brush with a variety of shades of grays, tans, black & white to look like stone finish (add in a slight touch of green or yellow for a nice extra touch) **OR** find a stone siding for purchase in a hobby store, mini store or online **OR** make a stone finish from paper clay
