FREEZER PAPER PRINTING from Preble McDaniel

To print on fabric, it needs to be stiff. I have successfully used the freezer paper method to do this. Here is what I did.

1. Cut the freezer paper to size such as $8 \frac{1}{2} \times 11$ inches. If you use an odd size, you will want to know that so you can select the custom size when printing.

2. Iron fabric so it has no wrinkles.

3. Iron the wrong side of fabric to the rough side of the freezer paper.

4. Cut the fabric to match the paper size.

5. If the fabric has come loose can iron again.

6. Prepare your Printies for printing. I like to use MS Word and I fill the page.

7. Prepare to print by inserting the fabric paper in the printer with the fabric side appropriate for your printer, example: mine is an HP and I would insert my paper with the fabric side down.

8. Set the properties for your printer. I use a custom selection like 'other' papers and a 'best' print setting.

9. Print

10. Remove backing.

Note, it is possible that the paper can be reused.
