# Potatoes, Carrots and Apples

#### MATERIALS

- · White Fimo
- · Red Fimo
- · Orange Fimo
- Burnt Umbre Paint
- · Wood stain (opt.)
- · Green tissue paper
- · Brown package mailing tape
- Small flat basket
- Air fern or lycopodium or similar for carrot tops
- · Very small rubber bands
- · Straight pins
- · Piece of styrofoam
- Toothpicks
- Foil pan or heavy duty aluminum foil to bake on
- · Wood glue
- Tacky glue
- Small wooden bowl
- · Piece of a dried flower stem
- (8 or 9) pieces of stripwood 1/16" thick by either 1/4" or 5/16" wide and 3/4" long
- Wooden circle 1/8" thick by 3/4" in diameter

#### TOOLS

- · Small pair of scissors
- Small paintbrush 0 or 1
- · X-acto knife

# Basket of Potatoes

 Soften a small piece of white fimo. Form 12-18 irregularly shaped ovals about 3/16" in diameter.



I chose this project because of the theme "Member's Gallery". I belong to the Big Apple Miniaturists or BAM, who meet in New York City. Every month a member is chosen to teach a small project to the rest of the group. This year we're making



potting or garden sheds and all our monthly projects revolve around that theme. I taught this project at our January meeting and thought I would also share it with all of you.

- Poke "eyes" in the potato with a toothpick and drop onto foil.
- Bake them in a 250-265 degree oven for 15-20 minutes, Let cool.
- Mix a drop of water with some burnt umbre paint and roll potatoes around in the paint to make them "dirty". Let dry.

#### Basket

- Trim any fuzzies off of stripwood pieces with a pair of scissors.

umbre paint. Stain the slats and the wooden circle, Let dry completely.

- 3. With a toothpick, run a line of wood glue halfway around edge of circle. Place flat on table and attach a few of the slats to the edge standing upright, to form basket. Let dry and repeat until you cannot fit any more slats. Let dry. A small rubber band wrapped around the bottom will help to hold them in place.
- 4. Cut of two strips of brown package

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#### Carro

 Soften a small piece of orange fimo. Roll six balls about 1/4" in diameter.



- Roll each ball into a long teardrop shape. Fat at the top and pointed at the bottom.
- Use the back edge of an x-acto knife blade to create the lines that run around the carrot. Hold each teardrop on your finger and gently roll the knife blade back and forth around the carrot. Watch your fingers! Be careful not to cut yourself.
- Poke a pin into the top of the carrot and place onto foil. Leave the pin in the carrot as you can use it for a handle later. Bake as above and let cool.
- 5. Holding the carrot by it's pin

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handle, give each a wash of burnt umbre paint to make it look dirty and to tone down the color of the fimo. Stick the pins into a piece of styrofoam to let carrots dry.

- 6. When dry, carefully pull pins out of carrots and insert a bit of air fern or lycopodium for the carrots green tops.
- 7. If you wish you may make two bunches of three carrots each by wrapping with a very small rubber band. I found mine in the hair care dept, of CVS where the brushes and hair clips, etc. were sold.
- 8. Glue into a small flat mini basket.

I developed the idea after I photographed a series of miniature rooms for a lady and she dropped one of her porcelain figures and it shattered.

Her husband had been laid off and it was hopeless to try and acquire a new one - or continue with her hobby as she employed multiple porcelain figures in each

I replaced it with my "faux porcelain" process and she loved it immediately. Now she could return to producing her mini scenes at a cost she could afford.

And it inspired me to use the technique for center pieces. (One friend shipped a box room only to discover that a fork lift had punched through it in the mailing process!!!)

So if sudden early retirement has pushed you out of the fine porcelain figures market, try faux porcelain. Note my figure in the Room of Angels has the sweetest face I've ever seen.
